County officers hunted Edward Williams in connection with, the murder, but he was never found. The murders, it is said, grew out of a distilling feud.

By Associated Press Washington, Aug. 26.—Action by the Haitien parliament on the treaty submitted by the United States pro-posing to the establishment for ten years of an American financial protec-torate over the island republic was awaited to-day by administration offi-ciais. The American charge at Port Au Prince had set noon yesterday as the time for approval of the treaty but the Haitiens protested against lim-ting debate in parliament and the time was extended until to-night.
