decks wash and the liner about to take the final plunge.

The captain and crew were taken off by the rescue boats and later landed in Queenstown by the steamer Empress.

The sinking of the Hesperian in deep water probably will prevent an investigation to determine whether the disaster resulted from a submarine's torpedo or from a mine.

Passengers and crew asserted positively that the vessel was struck by a torpedo but thus far no statement has been obtained from any one who saw a submarine or a torpedo.

The American embassy is receiving reports from Wesley Frost, American consul at Queenstown, on the question whether warning was given to the liner. Persons so far seen by Mr. Frost state that no warning was given.

Captain Main's statement probably will be taken later to-day.

The list of identified survivors still leaves a considerable number of persons unaccounted for. The Allan Line and the first ship to be sighted, which showed no sign of life, except for the death of one or two persons after reaching Queenstown.

Admiralty Not Officially Informed That Ship Was Attacked Without Warning

London, Sept. 6, 11:45 a. m. - The American consul at Queenstown, Wesley Frost, has telegraphed forward to the American embassy that the admiralty authorities had not been informed officially that the Hesperian had been torpedoed without warning.

From stories told by survivors the detailed account of the disaster is gradually being pieced together. It is confident that a satisfactory explanation would be forthcoming. While passengers aboard the Hesperian asserted that she was torpedoed without warning, the first official reports as announced by the State department did not clear up that point or indicate whether the ship attempted to escape.

There was no comment on the disaster from the White House or State Department but high officials it was understood thought it inconceivable that a German commander had attacked a peaceful passenger liner without warning.

Line's Officials Trying to Locate Those Missing

Queenstown, Sept. 6, 11:40 a. m. - The Queenstown agency of the Allan Line announced to-day that 45 first-class passengers on the Hesperian, 125 second-class and 165 third-class passengers had been accounted for but that it could not say at this time how many were missing.

The number of men in the crew was given as 282, of whom there have been accounted for 250, not including those who remained on the Hesperian until she went down.

These figures, the agency says, are approximately correct.

No news has been received here concerning the sinking of the Hesperian other than the facts that she went down about 6 o'clock this morning after that those on board were rescued. The weather last night was rather bad.

Hesperian Was Afloat Virtually 34 Hours

Liverpool, Sept. 6, 10:30 a. m. - Word has been received here that the Hesperian while making her way back to Queenstown, sank at 6:45 a. m. to-day.

The Hesperian remained afloat virtually 34 hours after being struck and it was hoped she could be towed into Queenstown. Captain Main and twenty members of the crew remained aboard. Several steamers were standing by.

Late reports showed the Hesperian was down by the bow to about 35 feet's float water but none has been seen. Captain Main was seen on the bridge, hopeful of being able to save his vessel.

Major J. S. Barnes, a Canadian officer and Lieutenant Lewis of one of the British rescue ships assisted the Hesperian's engineer in closing the bulk head doors so it was expected the water would be held from entering, permitting the steamer to remain afloat.
