

IN RAILWAYS' BARN

Great Number of Industries and Place Must Be Made For Keystoners in Several Districts of County



To adequately display the large rumber of industrial and welfare exhibits which will be shown in conjunction with the third State Welfare and Efficiency Conference in November the devices will be placed in the carbarns of the Harrisburg Railways Company instead of the Chestnut street auditorium.

From present indications a large number of engineers and other technical men interested in the well being of the people and the natural resources of the State will participate in the conference which is being arranged by the Engineers' Society of Pennsylvania and several of the State departments.

The big exhibit will be assigned to demonstrate the great strides that have been made for the industrial safety and welfare of the factory workers of this State. Machinery, electrical appliances for the home, office and factory will be displayed. Engineering instruments, factory supplies, economic methods, efficient and labor saving devices, in fact everything that affects the economic and industrial welfare of the residents of this State will be shown.

Expert Opinion to Be Called For in Penbrook

Called For in Penbrook

Publicity is the power that sets people to thinking and talking, and the amount of discussion that has taken place on the proposed paving in Penbrook has now crystallized public opinion to such an extent that almost every resident of the borough is interested in the improvement. Last evening a greater number of citizens attended the meeting of council than have been there since the question was taken up. Nothing definite was accomplished, however, but regular routine business. The paving ordinance was not advanced beyond second reading, as, in deference to those who for personal reasons have found it inconvenient to attend the many meetings to which they have been invited, the council deemed it advisable to call another special meeting for Friday evening of this week. At this meeting all property owners along Main street are requested to be present to consider whether it is best to resurface on the old foundation independent of State aid or whether to get new construction throughout according to the State's profile and with the financial co-operation of the State Highway Department and traction company. W. H. Wolf was not present in person, but in a letter he suggested a meeting of property owners along the street in consunction with council. In his letter Mr. Wolf charged that outsiders were more interested directly or by representatives than the taxpayers of the borough in the proposed paving of Main street. Friday evening he will no doubt enlighten them as to who these outsiders are and what their motives may be other than the natural public-spirited interest that all progressive citizens manifest in a muchneded public improvement.


