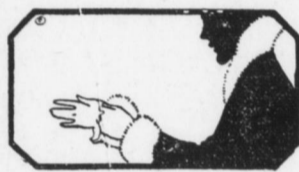

## WATCH YOUR HORSE

If he stops sweating suddenly, or if he breathes short and quick, or if his ears droop, he is in danger of heat stroke, and needs attention at once. If the horse is overcome by heat, throw him into the shade, remove harness and bridle, wash out his mouth, sponge him all over, shower his legs, and give him two ounces of aromatic spirits of ammonia, or two ounces of sweet spirits of nitre, in a pint of warm water; or give him a pint of coffee, warm. Cool his head at once.
