Mr. Rhinehart gave the signal to the car ahead of him to turn out to one side of the road to allow him to pass. The signal was obeyed and the western car turned out. In some way, not yet made clear, the car of Mr. Rhinehart went into a deep ditch and turned over.

Miss Emma Shockey received a fractured skull, a fractured jaw and had her chest crushed, and at the Chambersburg Hospital last night it was said she would die; Mr. Shockey, the girl's father, was also injured about the body, while Mrs. Rhinehart and Miss Rhinehart and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Snively escaped with minor injuries.
