

#### Scranton Man Instantly Killed When His Auto Strikes Team on Highway

Gettysburg, Pa., Sept. 23.—Hurled down a 15-foot embankment when his automobile struck a team at the bridge that spans the Great Conewago creek nine miles east of Gettysburg on the York road, Harold M. Swing, Scranton, aged about 35 years, was almost instantly killed last evening at 3.30 o'clock. His machine turned completely around in its descent over the embankment and pitched Swing from the seat. He was found about six feet from the car and died five minutes later before a physician could reach him.
