SPECIAL STOCKS ARE CONSPICUOUS

Baldwin Locomotive Opened With Fractional Gain Which Was Soon Extended

New York, Sept. 24.—Special stocks were again conspicuous at the opening of today's market with moderate improvement in some of the standard railroads. Baldwin Locomotive opened with a fractional gain, which was soon extended to 2 1/2%, placing it at the new high price of 92 1/2. International Nickel recovered five points of yesterday's late setback at 217, and Colorado Fuel, Bethlehem Steel, American Car, American Locomotive, American Woolen and the Maxwell motor issues were higher by 1 to 2 points. U. S. Steel opened at a slight advance, but soon reached to 77 1/2, yesterday's final. Railroads also lost initial gains.

NEW PENSIONER HAS FINE RECORD

Michael C. Loughrey, Reading Engineer, Retires After Many Years' Service

Philadelphia, Sept. 24.—After nearly 40 years of service as engineer on the Reading Railway, Michael C. Loughrey, of this city, has been retired on pension and given the privilege of riding free on the company's trains for the rest of his life. Loughrey has long been in the service of the Reading and New York and has the record of having made the 90-mile run in 84 minutes, and this record having been covered at the rate of little more than a mile a minute. This record was established February 4, 1902, and the passengers included President Baer and J. Pierpont Morgan.

More Improvements in P. R. R. Freight Traffic

Freight movement continues to improve over the lines of the Pennsylvania Railroad. For the first three weeks of September, as noted at eight observation points, the movement totaled 682,273 cars, an increase of 8,470, while the daily average movement was 26,767 cars, an increase of 2784 cars or 11.6 per cent. In the first week of the month the movement shows an increase of 11 per cent for the week ending 15 per cent, and in the third week 9.1 per cent.

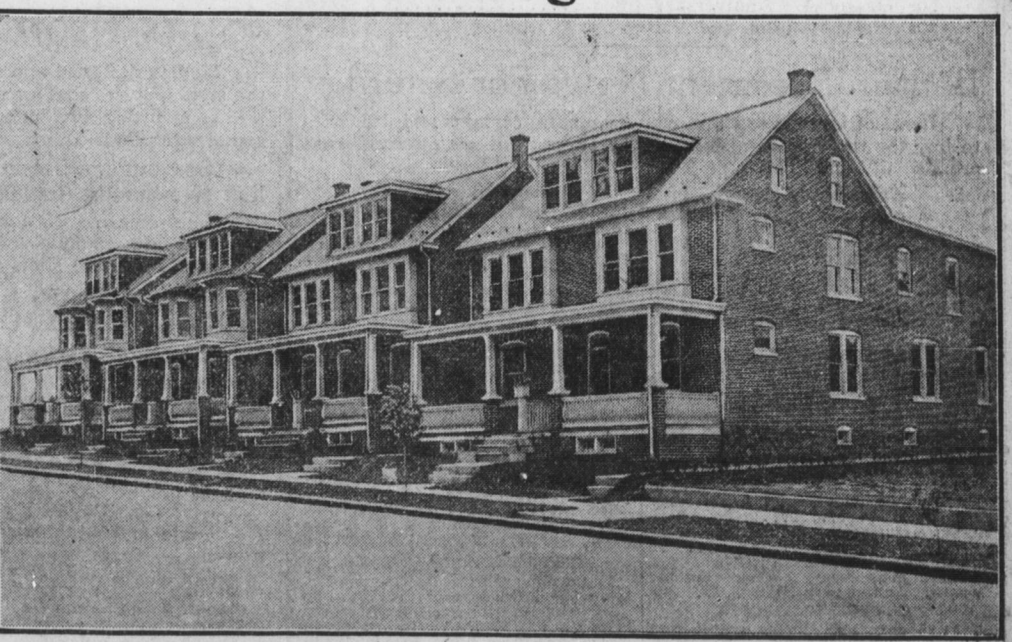
