The records of the board showed that 221 Republican ballots had been issued. The returns, however, showed that Benjamin Smith, Weills' opponent, received 180 votes and that Weills got 77, a total of 257.

Petrograd, Oct. 6, via London, 4.14 P. M.—Bulgaria has rejected the Russian demands and has sent an ultimatum to Serbia concerning Macedonia, according to information which has reached the Serbian Archimandrste Michael, says a Moscow telegram to the Bourse Gazette. Bulgaria demands that Serbia reply to the ultimatum within twenty-four hours.

The resignation of Premier Venizelos and his cabinet has been accepted by King Constantine of Greece. Official advices to this effect were received in London to-day.

The Greek premier's resignation, which likes further complicated the fiready decidedly uncertain Balkan situation, was because the King informed M. Velezelos that he could not pursue the cabinet's policy to the end according to Athens advices. The premier had indicated that the favored strong support of Serbia in compliance with Greece's treaty obligations.
