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TECH HIGH TEAM PLAYS AT EASTON

Two Players, Britsch and McKay Back in Lineup; Lancaster Gets Open Date

With the strongest line-up of the season, the Tech High school squad will leave to-morrow morning on the "Queen of the Valley" for Easton, where it will play its first football game with the Easton High school eleven.

Included among the players will be Britsch, the school's star quarterback who has been out of the game this season because of scholastic conditions. His presence will add much to the offensive strength of the team.

McKay will also be in the line-up, starting at tackle; he will also be given a chance in the backfield. C. Snyder, a center, will make his first appearance of the year in this game. His passing and aggressive defense will strengthen the middle of the line. Others in the squad included Captain Harris, McCurdy, Cocklin, Beck, Philippelli, Cole, Todd, Gipple, McFarland, Matthews, Garman, Lauster and Lloyd. The players will be in charge of Coach Whitney, Trainer Kelley and Faculty Director Grubb. During the trip the squad will be entertained at Lafayette College and Lehigh University. Professor Grubb has closed a game for November 13 with Lancaster High at that place.

Speculators Get Tickets; Prices Reach Top Notch

Philadelphia, Oct. 8.—Tickets went to the baseball public yesterday through two main channels, the Philadelphia National League club and speculators. The distribution by the club took place at the park, Fifteenth and Huntingdon streets, and the offices of the Stock Exchange Building. The scalper sale was a hotel and open-air proposition.

An army of scalpers surrounded the Bellevue-Stratford, Walton, Continental, Adelphi, Ritz-Carlton and other hotels. They were vociferous in their expressions of their willingness to buy and sell, but it was a good deal easier to sell to them than to buy from them.

They had some pasteboards, but they lacked quantities, and what they had they held for high prices. A single strip ticket good for three games and worth at its face value \$9 sold at prices all the way from \$20 to \$40.

At the big hotels there was little effort to interfere with the speculators and they mingled freely with the guests, and at the Bellevue actually blocked the entrances.

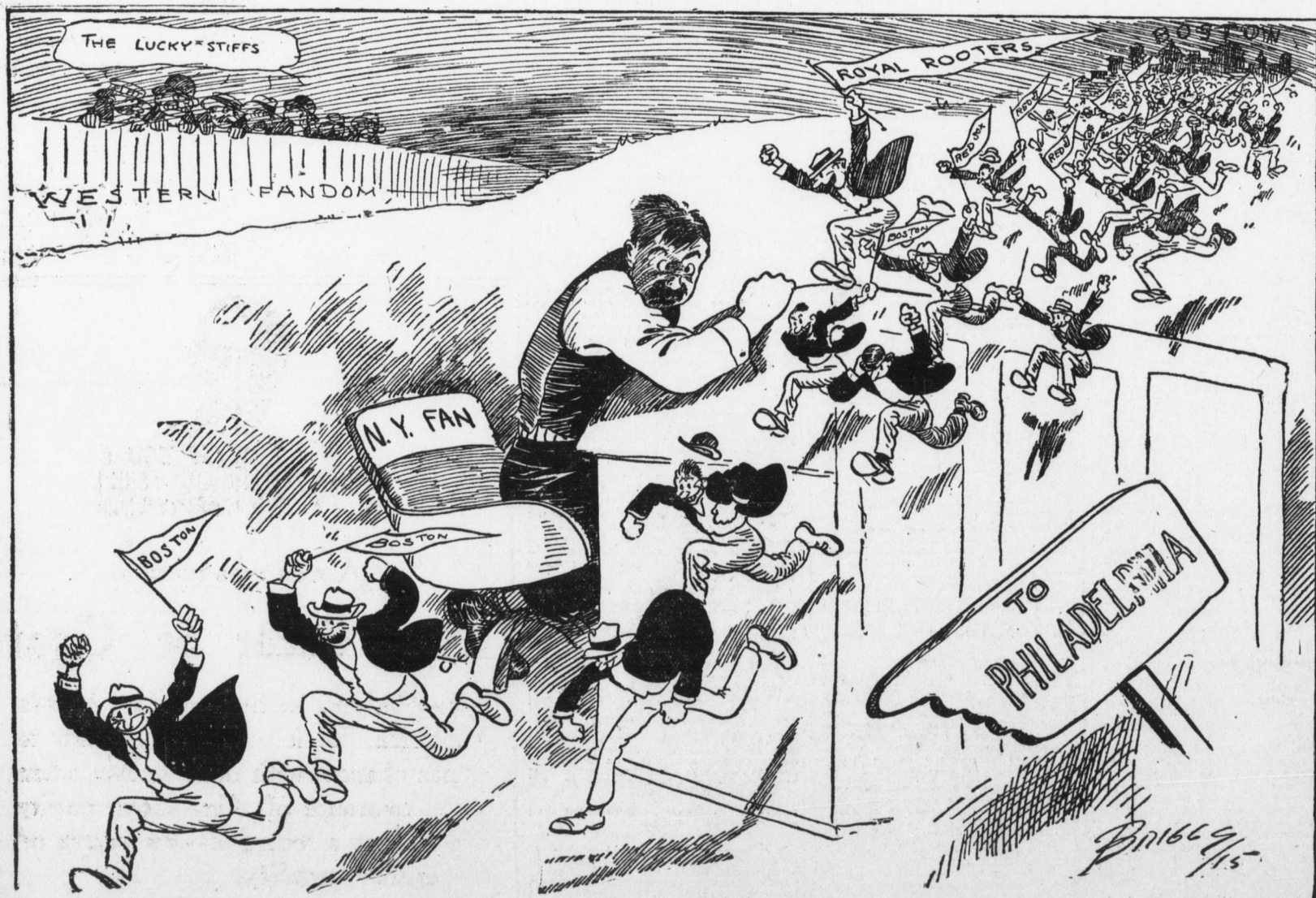
