Child Labor Laws
Paul N. Furman, chief of the bureau of statistics and information of the Department of Labor and Industry, discussed the features of the new child labor law before the club. He told of the co-operative work of the representatives of the Department of Labor and Industry and the Department of Public Instruction in explaining the requirements of the new law to officers of the school districts and employers in every section of Pennsylvania.
The new law, which goes into effect next January 1, he explained, requires child workers between the ages of 14 and 16 to attend continuation schools for at least eight hours a week between 8 o'clock in the morning and 5 o'clock in the evening on any week day except Saturday.
The state and school districts share the expense of providing teachers and supplying equipment for the continuation schools in all industrial districts.
