ABSENCE OF OXYGEN FATAL

Chicago, Oct. 11 .- Otto Hardekopf, proprietor of a small meat market, his wife and two daughters met death from suffocation to-day. The family lived in apartments over the shop. According to a physician who examined the bodies the oxygen in the apartments, doors and windows of which were closed, was entirely consumed by gas jets burning under a wash boiler in the kitchen. The absence of this element from the air which the victims breathed. caused death. he said.
