Newark, N. J., Oct. 15. — Calvin McClelland, professor of possession in law at the New Jersey Law School, answered yesterday a question of possession upon which for a week some of the brightest minos in New Jersey have been concentrated, even to the exclusion of the world series.

The question was: Who is in possession of a baseball after it has left the hand o fthe pitcher and is on its way toward the batter? The answer given by Professor McClelland follows:

"Possession is manifested control over an object and present intention to exclude others from it. The pitcher has manifested control because, when he throws the ball, it is his intention to exclude it from the batter. Therefore, the ball is in the possession of the pitcher until the catcher gets his hands on it."
