A rich woman has given \$3,500 to land, and the opening of this aristocratic burying ground for pampered Fidos is to be accomplished with much ceremony, with a dog standing at the gate to receive the first canine funeral that takes place.

What do you think of that? Isn't it enough to make even a dog howl with disgusted protest?

What sort of a heart can a woman have who gives \$3,500 to build a mausoleum for dogs, when there are tens of thousands of starving babies at her very door?

What kind of a queer, distorted philanthropy can prompt such a gift that puts the welfare of a dead animal above that of a live human being?

Thirty-five hundred dollars is a large sum. With it one can do much to alleviate the sufferings of the world. With it one can save many lives and bring happiness into many homes. With it one can change the whole course of existence for dozens of people and lift them out of the slough of misfortune up on to the broad highway where they can make their own way toward success.

The hot summer is upon us in which the babies of the slums sicken and die mainly because they are undernourished and their poor mothers have not the means with which to buy milk for them or the ice with which to keep what they do buy fresh and sweet.

Hundreds could be saved by \$3,500 worth of milk.

Hundreds of these babies will perish within the next three months who could be saved if the \$3,500 that is going into this cemetery for dogs was spent on establishing pure milk stations where good milk would be given away to the needy.

Go down any of the streets of the East Side on a hot, sweltering day and look at the white, pinched faces of the little children whose only playground is the blistering sidewalk and whose every breath draws in the malodorous, contaminating air that seeps of garbage cans and decaying fruit and vegetables and all the evil smells

that abound where human beings live too closely crowded together.

If the spot, amid the trees and grasses of Long Island and swept by its sea winds that is to be set apart as sacred to the carcasses of dead dogs were turned into a playground for these poor living children, what a blessing it would be to them! How the fresh air would bring back the color to the pale little cheeks! How the flabby muscles would strengthen as they romped among the daisies! How the ozone of the country air would put to rout the demon of tuberculosis already beginning to hover about the doomed little creatures!

Thirty-five hundred dollars would give many a child the week or two in the country that would mean life and health to it. Surely an object is well worth while as preserving the bones of a deceased Pomeranian. Certainly the shouts of joy of little children going up from a beauty spot of nature are as pleasing to heaven as the wails and lamentations of a neurotic woman weeping over the tomb of her dead pug.

Would Establish Fine Summer Camp

Thirty-five hundred dollars would establish a summer camp where poor working girls who have come to the last ounce of their endurance could have a few weeks' rest and gather themselves together again and get fresh strength and courage to begin the battle of life once more.

It would make a place where overworked mothers with their sickly babies could go for a little while and be given a new lease on life. It would buy an entrance into a home for many a forlorn old woman where she would be safe from the winds of winter and the suns of summer and be able to end her days in peace and comfort.

\$7.50 Plaited Skirt for Misses and Small Women, 16 and 18 years.

Here is a very charming, attractive and graceful skirt designed for young girls and for small women. It consists of one straight piece, plaited, consequently it gives long lines and long lines are very apt to be becoming. It can be made quite plain and finished at the slightly raised waist line or it can be cut off and joined to a plain yoke and this yoke can be used with or without suspenders. It is a very attractive and useful skirt as well as a fashionable one, excellent for the coat suit and for general wear, admirable for school and for similar needs. With the suspenders and yoke, it takes on quite a different effect from the plain plaited skirt, but the two are equally fashionable and equally desirable. Suspenders are to make something of a feature of the autumn fashions and are being extensively used. In the one view the skirt is made of Scotch tweed in a rich shade of brown with threads of red; in the other, it is made of Navy blue gabardine, with suspenders and yoke of taffeta, but as a matter of course, these last could match the skirt if preferred.
