PETERS FARM AT HERSHEY IS SOLD

Harrisburg Capital Takes Over Option and Will Plot 74 Acres Adjoining Chocolate Town

The expansion of the town of Hershey to the south is now made possible by the purchase of the Peters farm by the State Real Estate Company of Harrisburg, an incorporated company composed of local men who believe this tract of land offers exceptional advantages for development. The land purchased includes seventy-four acres directly adjoining Hershey on the south, a part of which comes up to within one square of the principal business corner of Hershey. Years ago Jacob Engel provided in his will for his three sons and left a sum of money for his daughter, Mrs. Leah Peters, with instructions to the trustees that this money should be invested in improved real estate, the income and use of which should be for Leah Peters during life, after which it would revert to the heirs, Benjamin E. Peters, James W. Steiner and his wife, Elizabeth E. Steiner.

THREE MONUMENTS UNVEILED

Interesting Ceremonies at Site of Old Fort Loudon Special to The Telegraph Chambersburg, Pa., Oct. 21.—In the village of Fort Loudon, where Thomas A. Scott was born, three monuments were dedicated yesterday. They mark the site of the old Fort Loudon, built against the French and Indians in 1758. Judge W. Rush Gillan presided over the exercises and the main addresses were by William S. Stenger, of Philadelphia, who was born in Loudon; the Rev. Dr. George Donehoo, of Coudersport, secretary of the State Historical Commission, and the Rev. Dr. Cyrus C. Cort, of Overlea, Md. One of the guests was Mrs. J. E. Thropp, of Bedford, daughter of the late Colonel T. A. Scott, who chose a site and made arrangements for a monument in the village in honor of her distinguished father.
