New York, Oct. 23.—The New York Central Railroad, notwithstanding its recent heavy purchases of rails, is sadly in need of heavy sections for laying this Fall. It has consequently placed supplementary contracts for about 10,000 tons of 105-pound sections for immediate delivery, 5,000 tons of for immediate delivery, 5,000 tons of which will be rolled by the Lackawanna Steel Company at Buffalo, and 3,000 tons by the Illinois Steel Company at Chicago. Other Eastern mills are being asked for prices on several thousand ton lots, but have refused the business because of heavy pressure from business already booked.

J. P. Morgan & Company through their export department, have placed additional contracts for about 80,000 tons of steel rounds for shipment to France and Great Britain in December and January.
