OVER 5,000 CAN HELP THE CENSOR

Governor Brumbaugh's Letter Will Bring Army to Detect Unlicensed Pictures

As a result of Governor Martin G. Brumbaugh's request that heads of de-partments of the State government ask people under their authority to assist the State Board of Censors in detect-

people under their authority to assist the State Board of Censors in detecting unlicensed moving picture films it is estimated that between 5,000 and 6,000 persons are available for this volunteer duty. The Governor's letter has considerably interested Capitol Hill and apparently quite a few people are very willing to give their aid.

All told there are almost 6,000 persons on the State payroll, counting in the numerous attaches of the State highway system, the attaches of the Department of Health and of the Board of Public Grounds and Buildings, the State game, fish and otherwardens, the State police and attaches of bureaus and offices. They are scatered through every county in the State duty ever known.

Officials of the Board of Censors have been going ahead putting the new rules and regulations for moving pictures into operation, and while there has been some grumbling, no suits have yet been brought to restrain the State authorities or to test the new rules. Some of the producers are understood to have given assurance of co-operation in enforcement of the act.


