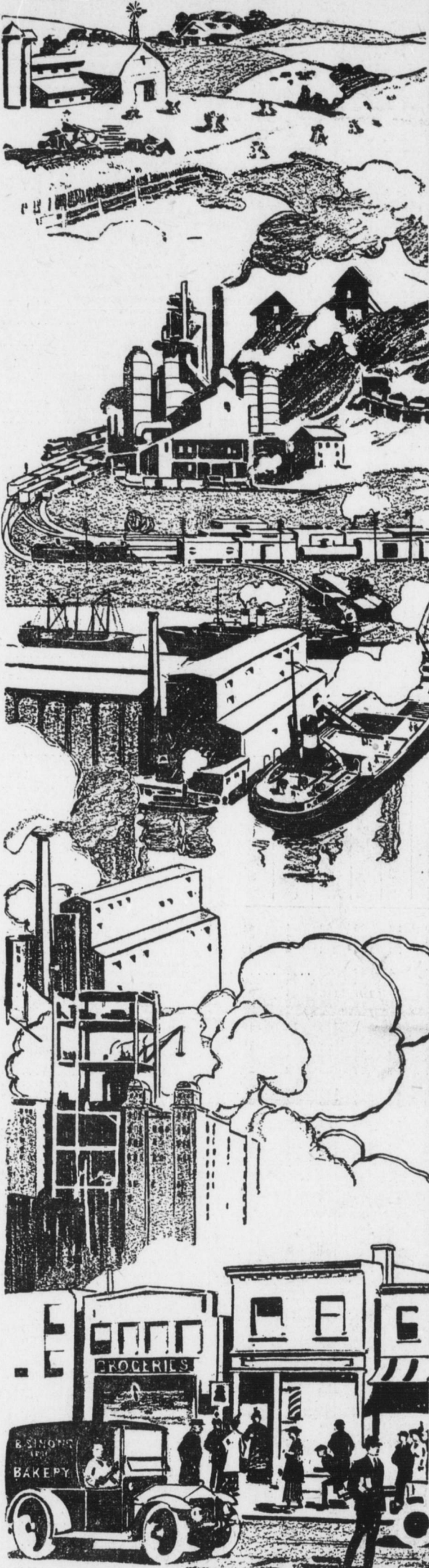

Some Well-known Men Defeated in the Struggles Because of License Issue

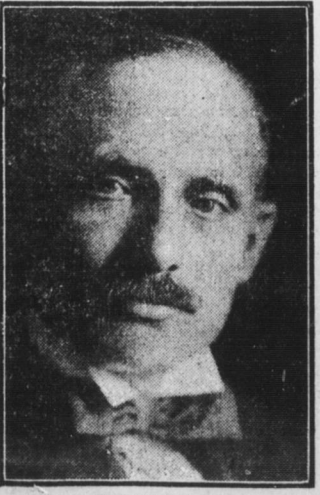
In addition to its interesting contest for election of three superior court judges there were elections in Pennsylvania yesterday for almost thirty common pleas judgeships, two orphans court judgeships and six associate judgeships, together with a municipal court election in Philadelphia.

DON McPHERSON WINS By Associated Press Gettysburg, Pa., Nov. 3.—Donald P. Butt won in Fulton county, the other part of the district by about 200. Thirty-one of the forty districts gave 737 for suffrage, and 1893 against. The new judge is a former Senator and cousin of Judge John B. McPherson.

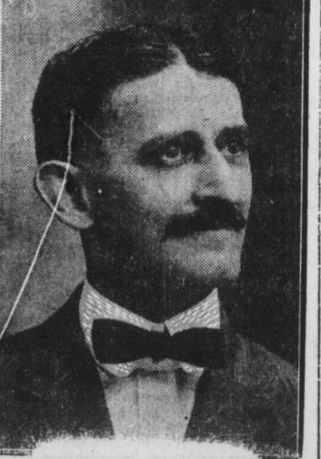
