WARM FIGHTS IN NEARBY PLACES

Republicans Sweep All Before Them; Several Women Suffrage Surprises

Warm fights from the nearby counties, townships and boroughs marked election day in several places a number of surprises were sprung. The results showed everywhere the return to the Republican fold of the rank and file of the voters and indicates that the Democratic vote in 1916 will be the lightest in years. Some of the nearby fights are given below.

ENOLA STRONG FOR SUFFRAGE

Enola, Pa., Nov. 4.—The election of Tuesday was one of the surprises of the season. The Enola district, being composed of three voting districts gave the woman suffrage cause 118 for and 78 against for the upper district, but in the whole lost by 6 votes. MIFFLIN COUNTY RETURNS

Lewistown, Pa., Nov. 4.—The fight for the judgeship in the Mifflin-Huntingdon-Bedford district was a warm one. Joseph M. Woodcock, the present incumbent of the district attorney's office, was defeated by L. J. Durbin by 375 majority. M. Luther McClintic was elected county treasurer over L. U. Orth by 732 majority. G. B. Orady with 2,296, J. H. Wilson with 1,452 and J. B. Head with 1,345 votes were victorious in Mifflin county for the State Superior Court.

DEMOCRATIC SCHOOL BOARD

Dillsburg, Pa., Nov. 4.—A hard contested election of borough officers held here on Tuesday resulted in the election of four Democratic school directors. C. K. Bushey, Walter B. Dick, L. Bentz and J. S. Kapp, over H. M. Evans, Harry Ensigner, L. W. Arnold and R. S. Clark, the Republican candidates; also free Democratic councilmen, Charles Couslin, J. C. Baker and James Williams, over D. W. Wagner, J. H. Hess and S. S. Shetter, Republicans, and judge of election, Adam Miller, over B. H. Shriner, the Republican candidate. Charles Blauser was defeated for auditor by Harry Ulrich, the Republican candidate, and G. K. Weaver, Republican, won over G. C. Fisher, Democrat, for constable. There being only two candidates for justice of the peace, J. K. Evans, Democrat, and H. Klugh, Republican, were elected.
