50TH YEAR OF LEBANON VALLEY LANDIS CO. MAY OPERATE PLANT

Anniversary of Founding of College Will Be Observed Commencement Week

Receivers of Flinchbaugh Company Ask Permission to Lease Portion of Shops

Annville, Pa., Nov. 5.—This year Lebanon Valley College will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of that institution with a commencement week that promises to be of greater importance than any other occasion that has marked the past graduating exercises.
