BROOKLYN FIRE CINTERNATIONAL FILM SERVICE

The picture shows the burning old five-story brick building in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, in which a half dozen girls perished in the fire on Saturday, and a hundred were severely injured while jumping to the sidewalk below. About 1,000 girls were working in the factory rooms of the Diamond Candy factory and the Essex Shirtwaist Company in the building when the fire broke out. The flames leaped up the narrow wooden stairways shutting off escape that way. Many of the windows giving on the fire escapes refused to work, and even when the girls reached the iron fire escapes on the front of the building, flames had licked through the windows and turned the escapes into raging griddles. These fire escapes can be seen in the picture under the spray of water from the fire hose. The fire escapes were covered with clothing which the girls had torn from their bodies in an effort to keep the fire from them and in their haste to escape the flames. Many jumped, missing the nets in the street and were crushed to death on the sidewalks.


