# NEWS OF THE RAILROADS

### THOUSANDS OF CARS STALLED

War Exports Hold Up Railroads; May Have to Turn **Down Business** 

New York, Nov. 17.—Railroad men n this city view the freight congestion

New York, Nov. 17.—Railroad men in this city view the freight congestion n and around New York with concern. The situation is growing more serious every day and at present there so no relief in sight. It will take undreds of ships to carry away the sports that are now sidetracked and perating men do not know where ne ships are coming from.

Thousands of cars are stalled within distance of 300 miles of New York. It was learned to-day that between 600 and 700 freight cars, loaded with locomotive parts consigned to Russia, are included in the line-up. One road leading to Pittsburgh has between 7,-900 and 10,000 filled cars blocked, all the freight in this lot being consigned to New York for export.

A problem which is facing the railroads is the loss which must be incurred if the freight cars can not be nade to move to their destination. Freight consigned to domestic points accumulates demurrage charges if not taken off the cars within a limited ime. There is no demurrage charges for export freight, however, and shippers are permitted to unload at will. The railroads, naturally, reduce their arning capacity when thousands of ars are held out of service. In advision, they face the losses which would result from a general car short-year.

The president of one of the big astern roads said to-day that the eight congestion was the worst hich he could recall. His company ad not yet been forced to turn down usiness, he said, but such a course tight follow if ships were not found a relieve the situation.


