

Locking The Stable Door

Being Article No. 9 on the subject of Jitney Regulation.

Recently in a western town a jitney knocked down and killed the bread earner of a large family.

It was found that the driver of the car had been out of work—to make a position for himself he purchased a car on the basis of a \$5.00 payment out of each day's receipts—had operated the car on this basis three days—and his \$15 interest in the machine was the extent of his responsibility upon which a destitute family could seek to recover its loss.

THEN—municipal authorities passed an ordinance requiring a \$10,000 bond from each jitney operator.

But—the horse had been stolen.

Traffic has doubled in Harrisburg since the advent of the jitney—its attendant dangers have increased in direct ratio.

No protection for you has been demanded of the jitney—

And you are entitled to protection.

Some jitney operators are, no doubt, responsible.

Some are not—and from those who are not responsible a bond

in suitable amount should be required by the city.

And a suitable amount means not only provision for one—perhaps you—remember there may be a smashup in which five or six may be injured—they are all entitled to protection.

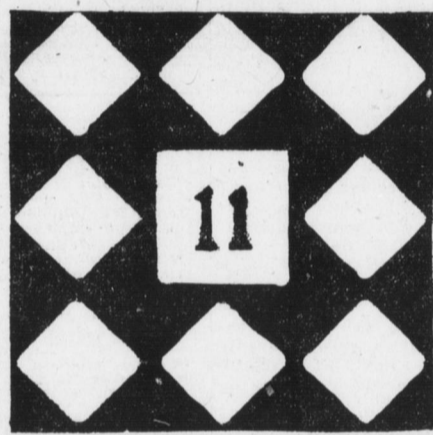
