first act. Certain it was that the piece moved with anything but vim until the appearance of Miss Thayer. Later, however, the company seemed to acquire a bit more interest in their work and from the beginning of the second act until the final act, the third show took on more interest, not so much from the standpoint of plot, but from the standpoint of interest in the players.

The music of "The Peasant Girl" is far above that of the ordinary light operas of today. Differing mainly in the fact that dialogue was sung instead of spoken, the show requires voices above the ordinary. Miss Thayer in her role of Helena was given many opportunities in song which delighted the audience. Almon Knowles as Bolo received a good part of the musical work, and in all of it did mightily well for his part. It is well and clear, but his enunciation is not particularly good. As the comedy star all credit must go primarily to Frank Dushon.

Taken all in all, "The Peasant Girl" as a piece is above the average run of the musical comedy type. Regrettable that a better company to support the star, Miss Thayer, was not provided, as an entertainment the show can measure up to the standard of shows that have been provided by the Harrisburg theaters this season.

### JEWISH HOLIDAY BEGINS TOMORROW

Observance of Feast of Dedication Will Continue 8 Days; Elaborate Preparations

Commencing at sundown to-morrow evening, the Jewish people of the city and the country at large will institute the observance of Hanukkah, or the Feast of Dedication. Elaborate preparations are being made by local Hebrews for the celebration of the festival period which is one of the most important in the church calendar. The ancient ritual with which the feast is celebrated will be enacted by the various local congregations of the Jewish people. The Festival Hanuk-

kah takes place on December 2, or corresponding to the Hebrew date, the twenty-fifth day of Kislev, and lasts eight days.

A feature of the observance, which is in commemoration of the victories of the Maccabees over the Syrians, is the lighting of eight menorah lamps, one each night during the period of celebration. In conformity with the ancient customs of observing the festival, one of the most beautiful features of the celebration is participated in by the children. In reality it is a children's holiday and the children of the religious schools celebrate it with elaborate festivities. In the homes songs will accompany the kindling of the lights and the ritualistic service of the synagogue will be enhanced by the recital of selected Psalms.

The occasion of the festival is one of paramount historic significance to the Jewish people. Antiochus, King of Syria, in the second century before the common era, aspired to dominate the countries of the East. The Jews, devoted to their religion and its moralities, resented the intrusion. Under the

leadership of Judas Maccabees they met the Syrians on the battlefield and after successive victories they achieved their emancipation and re-established their religious practices of their forefathers. True to the spirit of Judaism, they proceeded at once to rededicate their temple.

A legend says that, at the rededication exercises of the temple, a cress of oil filled every lamp so that the great edifice was resplendent with light. This is signalized in the observance of the festival by lights in the homes, increasing with each passing evening of the observance, culminating with eight links on the eighth night.
