NEW RULINGS ON COMPENSATION

State and Municipal Appointive Employes Come Under Regulations of Act

Following the announcement that the United States Steel Company has accepted the Workmen's Compensation law in both "the letter and the

spirit," the Workmen's Compensation Board promulgated the following new rulings: "All persons appointed by and on the payrolls of a State, county, city, borough, township, school board or other governmental subdivision of the State are employes of such State, county, city, borough, township, school board or other governmental subdivision of the State for the purpose of compensation. "The ordinary private chauffeur while acting as such is engaged in domestic service within the meaning of the Supplement No. 249, 1915, and is, therefore, not covered by the Workmen's Compensation act of 1915. "The Board rules that charitable corporations, colleges, hospitals, etc., being corporations not for profit are

employers within the meaning of the act and that if they do not give to their employes the notices provided in Section 302 they will be liable for Compensation under article 3. "The Board declines to give a ruling as to the liability under article 2 of a charitable corporation which rejects article 3 as this question is one for the determination of the Courts and not the Board. "Italians Killed Francis Rawle and Joseph W. Henderson of Philadelphia, counsel for the Italian consulate in Philadelphia appeared before the Board to discuss the forms to be adopted for establishing proof of death of Italian workers in Pennsylvania and what proofs will be required by the Board to determine the dependents in Italy of workers

killed in this country. The attorneys state that there are about 400,000 Italians in Pennsylvania. The Board received assurance that the United States Steel Corporation will give its complete co-operation in complying with the Workmen's Compensation act of Pennsylvania, from David A. Reed, of the legal firm of Reed, Smith, Shaw and Bea, of Pittsburgh, counsel for the steel corporation. The subsidiary companies in Pennsylvania include: The Carnegie Steel Company, National Tube Company, American Bridge Company, American Steel and Wire Company, American Sheet and Tin Plate Company, Pittsburgh Bessemer and Lake Erie Railroad Company, and H. C. Frick Coke Company. Mr. Reed in his letter gave the

Workmen's Compensation Board the following assurance: "I wish to assure you, although I think it is quite evident, that it is the disposition of the steel corporation and its executive officers without exception, to do all in their power to comply, not only with the letter but the spirit of this law."
