

CLOTURE FIGHT SPLITS CAUCUS

Many Democratic Senators Are Vigorously Opposing Rule: Other Contests

Washington, Dec. 2.—The contest over the adoption of a rule to provide for cloture of debate was renewed when Senate Democrats continued their caucus to-day.

The way for action on the measure had been paved as the result of an agreement reported by the Special Rules committee proposing limitation of debate to prevent filibustering. The cloture rule would provide means for forcing a measure to a vote whenever filibustering tactics became apparent.

Indications were that the rule would not be approved without a vigorous fight. Several Democratic Senators had announced their intention to oppose it.

A lively contest also is promised over the caucus selection to-morrow of a president pro tempore of the Senate. Senator Clarke, of Arkansas, who is a candidate for re-election to that place, will have Senator Pomeroy of Ohio, as an opponent. The entrance of the latter into the race is the culmination of opposition to Senator Clarke because of his antagonism to the ship purchase bill at the last session. Administration senators had sought, however, to ally the opposition for party harmony.

Believes Ship Rammaged Submerged Submarine

Newport News, Va., Dec. 2.—Captain Glasen, of the British steamer Inverkip, which went into drydock here for rush repairs to-day, says he believes he accidentally rammaged a submerged submarine while passing out the straits of Gibraltar on November 6.

The Inverkip, from Valencia to Norfolk, in ballast, to load coal, about one hour's run from Gibraltar when there was a great shock. The ship's officers saw all rise to the surface of the water and this, with the fact that a long diagonal dent was made in the bottom of the Inverkip, leads Captain Glasen to believe he struck a submarine. Several holes were torn in the Inverkip's hull tanks, and but for extremely calm weather Captain Glasen believes his ship would have sunk immediately. The steamer returned to Gibraltar, where the temporary repairs were made.

often confused and got off at the wrong stop. Packages which bore the address "Park avenue" were frequently dropped off at the wrong street. Council all acted favorably on the letter and appointed Messrs. Deen and Myers members of a committee to meet with members of the Planning Commission with a view to changing the names of all streets crossing the pike from the river to the western limits of Camp Hill. The conferences which have thus far been held have resulted in the adoption of a plan to number all the cross streets instead of giving them names.

Want Public Sentiment

Mr. Deen and Mr. Myers are very much interested in improvements along the West Shore and they have been discussing with members of the Planning Commission improvements for Camp Hill and the vicinity. When the movement for improvements all through lower Cumberland county was inaugurated a few weeks ago they did not feel that they were able to give the entire West Shore. The councilmanic committee is the only one which has been appointed at any time to confer with the commission and Mr. Deen and Mr. Myers believe that if they could meet some of the citizens in the other towns they could obtain the sentiment of the entire "cross-river community" and give the Planning Commission some facts on which to work.

With this idea in view the committee's report to the Thursday night will recommend that the commission be empowered to invite other West Shore citizens to a meeting of the committee and members of the commission.

When this meeting of councilmen, planners and such others as may be asked to give their views on improvement it held it is quite likely that at that time a program will be mapped out and a call issued for a meeting of all persons along the West Shore who are interested in improvements. Camp Hill councilmen have been keenly interested in the development of the "cross-river territory" and the councilmanic committee is preparing to take the initiative in organizing a big improvement association.

Mr. Deen Enthused Mr. Deen is enthused over the possibilities for Camp Hill if a united effort is put forth by all the towns. He favors the proposed new route between Camp Hill and Wormleysburg and says that it will greatly aid in the
