No Real Leaders According to International Figures, but Fast Men

International averages, compiled by William J. Manely, show fast work during last season.

Buffalo leads in club fielding with a percentage of .969, but there is only a difference of 17 points between the Bisons and Richmond.

According to the averages, and judging a player by the number of games played, the best fielding team in the International League is made up as follows: First baseman, Judge, Buffalo, now with the Washington Americans, .994; second baseman, Truesdale, Jersey City, who in 129 games had a percentage of .971.

By all odds the best third baseman was Bues, Jersey City, with .967 for 130 games.
