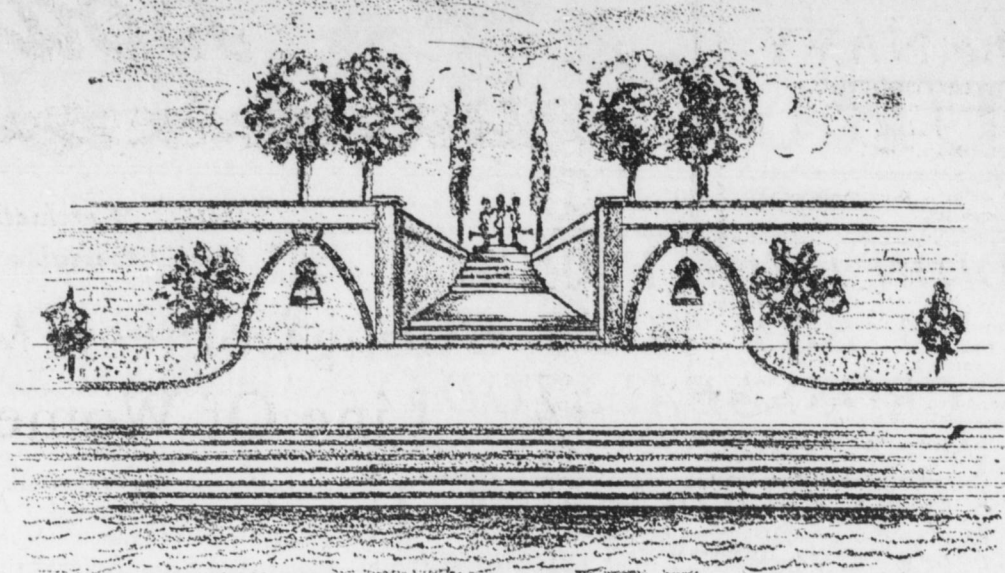
Bear Dinner For Hump Crew of Enola Yards
