INJUNCTION STOPS FIREHOUSE SALE

Waynesboro Taxpayers Take Matter Before Franklin County Court

Waynesboro, Pa., Dec. 13.—Sale of the Firemen's Hall here did not take place, as scheduled, on Saturday, on account of an injunction taken out by a number of firemen and taxpayers of the city, passed upon by Judge W. Rush Gillan, of Chambersburg, just a few minutes before the property was to have been offered.

property was circulated and got hundreds of signers. This petition was ignored and the committee of firemen bearing the petition to the meeting of town council, was not permitted an audience in the matter or allowed in the meeting room.

This brought about more trouble, and as the taxpayers of Waynesboro were of the opinion that the town hall was the property of the citizens of Waynesboro, and their sympathies were with the men who have been protecting the town from fire for years they took an appeal to the Court.

Judge Gillan granted a writ of injunction directed against the Burgess and Town Council of Waynesboro, enjoining them from proceeding with the sale of Firemen's Hall.
