From all quarters reports have been spread that a peace protocol will be signed early next week which will bring the Federal League into the fold and spike the guns which fans and magnates agree have barked too long for the good of the game.

There is little doubt that peace will be proposed at this meeting. President Tener is not opposed to an adjustment of conditions which will work for the betterment of the game.

It has been rumored recently that several men allied with the Federal League have sought the opportunity to buy the franchises of National League clubs.

Governor Tener's pacific attitude leads many to believe that he is paving the way for the announcement of peace. It is known that Schuyler Britton, part owner of the Cardinals has been in conference with certain men in the Federal League and has set a price upon his holdings in the St. Louis club.
