New York, Dec. 13.—In the opinion of National League magnates, peace must come soon or not at all. The meeting, scheduled to start to-morrow promises to be the most important, since the American League

fought for recognition.

From all quarters reports have been spread that a peace protocol may be signed early next week which will bring the Federal League into the fold and spike the guns which fans and magnates agree have barked too long for the good of the game. There may be many trades, too, for there is not a team in the league which feel that it can rest secure with its present material.

There is little doubt that peace will be proposed at this meeting. President Tener is not opposed to an adjustment of conditions which will work for the betterment of the game. He sounded the note the other day when he said that before any peace could be made with the cohorts of Gilmore all the leagues working under the National Agreement would have to be consulted.

It has been rumored recently that several men allied with the Federal League have sought the opportunity to buy the franchises of National League clubs. Harry F. Sinclair, Ed.
