SHARP ATTACK ON VALLEY RAILWAYS

Marysville Resident Files Complaint With Public Service Commission

Trolley car service maintained between Harrisburg and Marysville by the Valley Railways company is sharply attacked by John F. Shannon, Jr., a resident of Marysville and employed in this city, in a complaint filed with the Public Service Commission today.
