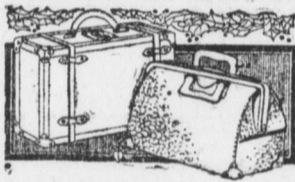

PAINTINGS START FROM THE COAST

Pan-American Art Works Will Be Disposed of About the State Capitol



The Pennsylvania State building at the San Francisco exposition has been sold and the mural decorations, paintings and furniture, are to be disposed of to the State Capitol, according to a report made to-day by Governor Brumbaugh by Chester P. Ray, executive officer of the State commission. Mr. Ray has returned from the exposition, where he had charge of closing up matters pertaining to the State commission.

The paintings and other objects will be placed in the capitol and the furniture used as far as practicable to furnish some of the offices for new State bureaus.

The commission will have a meeting shortly to close its business. Will Meet Here.—The Public Service Commission, which is holding hearings in several cities this week, will meet in Harrisburg next week, Monday having been fixed for acting up applications for approvals of contracts, agreements and similar matters. Among the cases to be taken up will be the Easton Transit Company crossing, Scranton and Wilkes-Barre grade crossings and argument in the New Castle grade crossing controversy. The hearings in the full crew complaint cases will be given Tuesday.

Censors Are Busy.—Arrests have been made in a dozen Pennsylvania cities for violation of the moving picture censorship law in the last eight weeks, according to men connected with the State Censors Board. The bulk of the prosecutions were for violations of the act forbidding display of pictures without State authority. The board has received considerable cooperation from people connected with the departments of the State government.

Demonstrations End.—Demonstrations for instruction of farmers and fruit growers of the state in methods of controlling fruit tree pests closed in Pennsylvania on this season to-day and will be resumed in May of next year. There were over 500 demonstrations held, every county having at least two and some more, according to the number of farms and orchards. The attendance is reported as being the largest since the Department of Agriculture began the work and in the last six years it is stated that the number of fruit trees, especially in industrial counties like Allegheny and Delaware, has materially increased.

New Liability Men.—Organization of a number of insurance companies with authority to write employers' liability insurance is contemplated, according to inquiries being made at the State Insurance Department. The department has had numerous callers who are interested in the formation of companies for charters for such companies are pending. In addition a number of outside insurance companies have applied for Pennsylvania rights.

Awards Made.—The awards of the contracts for the new State bridges at Sunbury and Camptown were made by the Board of Public Grounds and Buildings last night to M. H. Stobbing, W. E. B. Ensign, of this city, received the award for the Capitol sewer which is to prevent flooding of the basement.

Bridges Approved.—The Water Supply Commission last night approved plans for a dozen or more bridges for the Baltimore and Ohio Railway in Somerset county.

Many Cases.—Reports to the State Department of Health to-day were that there were 150 cases of measles in Orwigsburg.

Legislators Here.—Senator John W. Hollen, of Chambersburg, and Representative C. J. Hollingsworth, of Chester county, were callers at the Governor's office.

Appointments in Compensation.—Major M. A. Chertoff, former State bank examiner, prominent in National Guard and G. A. R. affairs was to-day appointed to a position in the compensation bureau and assigned to headquarters in this city. P. H. Howell, of Scranton, was appointed clerk to Referee G. W. Beamer.

Laundrymen Organize.—The State Laundry Owners' Mutual Liability Co., of Pittsburgh, was chartered to-day. William Frew Long, Pittsburgh, is president. Laundrymen all over the State are interested. W. E. Orth, of this city, is secretary.

Mumors of Uprisings in India Disturb China

Peking, Nov. 19.—(Correspondent's note) The Associated Press—China is disturbed by the rumors of serious uprisings in India. All telegrams concerning the Indian troubles estimate that the disturbance is the result of German activities made possible through the smuggling of arms from China. English newspapers charge the Chinese officials with negligence in preventing Germans from exporting arms and ammunition on and estimate that the Chinese are entirely too friendly with German agents.

Mothers' Pension Urged by East End Republicans

Members of the East End Republican Club, last night, endorsed the Mothers' Assistance Fund, provided for by the last Legislature. Resolutions were adopted urging the officials of Dauphin county to take early action in putting the provisions of the new law in force and calling upon the citizens of the county to lend their efforts in providing for needy mothers. East End members were informed that Dauphin county's share of this fund would amount to \$9,250, to be distributed to widowed mothers in monthly payments. A committee will be named to wait upon Dauphin county officials in the interest of this fund.

COAL OFFICIALS TO MEET HERE

Invited to Discuss State Insurance Fund With Members of Board

The State Insurance Fund Board, which has invited representatives of every coal company operating in Pennsylvania to meet its members at the State Capitol on next Tuesday, December 21, will probably complete its rates for insurance of coal miners in the State fund within the next three or four days. The officials of the fund have been securing data on accidents in coal mines in this and other States and a number of special investigations have been made with a view to meeting certain phases encountered in some of the larger mines.

The State Compensation authorities have had meetings with representatives of the railroads and the big steel and manufacturing companies of the State and efforts will be made to secure the hearty co-operation of the coal operators. The State Insurance Fund officials will make efforts to induce some of the coal operators to insure in the State fund instead of carrying their own insurance as the railroads and big steel companies intend to do.

Next Tuesday's meeting will bring together men whose operations mean over \$100,000,000 in wages and a big effort will be made to win them to the State fund. James W. Leech, of the Compensation board, and Albert L. Allen, assistant manager of the State fund, will be the speakers, while the counsel for the board will be present.

KING PETER MAY TAKE REFUGES IN ITALY

Paris, Dec. 16.—It is reported from Rome that King Peter of Serbia, driven from his country by the Teutonic invasion, will take refuge in Italy. A Rome dispatch to the Matin says the king has accepted Italy's offer of the palace at Caserta, near Naples, which is now being prepared for his use.

Crew of Foundered U. S. Steamer Is Brought In

New York, Dec. 16.—Captain Loughrane and the crew of eighteen of the American steamer Lucy Neff, which foundered yesterday off the Delaware coast, arrived here to-day on the British steamer Chaschill. Captain Loughrane said he sailed from Falmouth, Jamaica, December 6 with a cargo of logwood intended for American dye makers.

After encountering high seas and terrific gales for several days the Lucy Neff sprung several leaks on the night of December 14, and although the freighter was in constant danger of sinking, the crew remained on board until the Chaschill came to their assistance. Ten minutes after the last man had left the Lucy Neff she sank.

JAMES A. CAMPBELL SAID TO BE PICKED FOR MERGER HEAD

New York, Dec. 16.—It is probable that the merger of the Cambria Steel Company, the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company and the Lackawanna Steel Company will be effected on a cash basis. The Lackawanna Steel Company is understood to have been offered at \$80 a share for its stock, but has not reached a decision whether to accept that figure. The holders of Youngstown Sheet and Tube will receive \$80 and \$300 a share for their stock, it is said, and the Cambria will be the dominating figure in the new company. James A. Campbell, president of the Youngstown company, is said to have been picked to head the new organization if the merger is effected.
