C., Dec. 18.—More than three-quarters of a billion dol-lars' worth of war supplies were shipped from the United States from August 1, 1914, to October 31, 1915, according to figures made public. This does not include foodstuffs or clothing, with the exception of sugar and shoes. The actual value of the goods was \$785,599,403, of which \$100,000,060, approximately, represented last Octo-ber's shipments.
