In 1898 he was chairman of the President's commission to inquire into the management of the war with Spain. He was for a time commanderin-in-chief of the military order of the Loyal Legion.

General Dodge had a wide acquaint-ance in this city. He was a closs friend of Adjutant General Thomas J. Stewart and some years ago wrote a blography of the late John, C. Jamison, of this city, who fought under him throughout the Civil war.

One of First Engineers to Go on Honor Roll; Ran Famous French Engine

David Johnson, one of the first passenger engineers to be retired by the Pennsylvania railroad, died yesterday at his home in Altoona, aged 87 years. Death was due to pneumonia. The survivors are, two brothers, Morris road employe residing at 1319 Berryhill street, and William Johnson of Philadelphia. The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon at Altoona. "Dave" Johnson, as he was known

During the St. Louis Exposition when the big French locomotive was sent to United States for exhibition, Johnson ran the engine. Later when the Pennsylvania railroad purchased the big engine, he was given full charge of it. He had the distinction of being the first engineer to wear a uniform on an engine.
