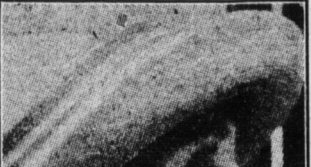
The part-writing cast which was given Mary Pickford is one worthy of the highest commendation. And the magnitude with which the play is staged is no less worthy of mention.

Moving Military Stores Out of Reach of Rebels

Peking, Dec. 8.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—President Yuan Shi-Kai is moving all military stores as rapidly as possible away from centers subject to attack by revolutionaries. Even before the recent attempt to capture the Kiangnan arsenal at Shanghai much of the machinery from that arsenal had been moved to the Hanany arsenal at Hankow. Military stores at Shanghai had also been sent to Tchchow, which is located in the interior on the railway connecting Shanghai and Peking and about midway between the two points.

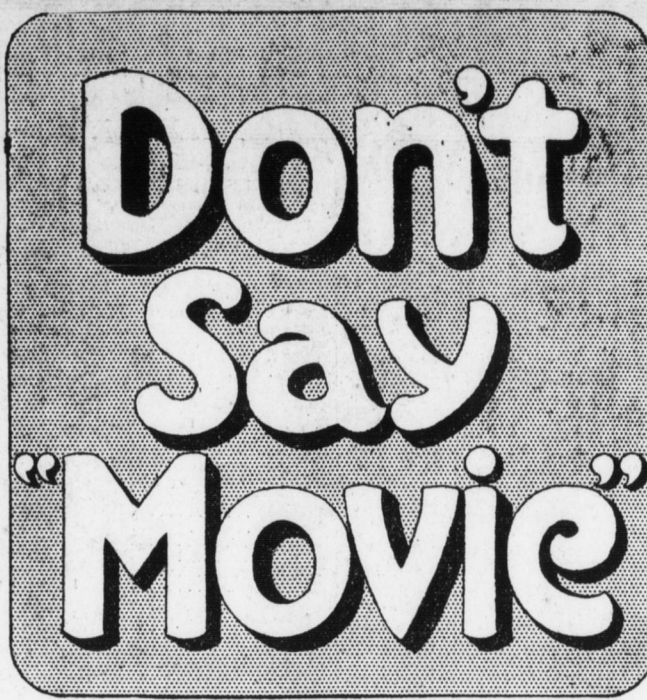
