were slightly lower with heaviness in Erie.

Coppers and specialties, particularly olls and some of the better known war descriptions, made substantial recoveries in the first hour, and Steel rose to 87½ before another selling movement of larger and wider proportions was encountered. On this decline Steel fell to 86%, with offerings ranging from 1,000 to over 4,000 shares. Other leaders, including standard railways, went lower, and some of the high-priced specialties followed the lead of General Motors, Agricultural Chemical preferred falling 8 to 64. Further heaviness was manifested with the approach of the noon hour on a combination of short selling and fresh liquidation. Bonds were irregular.
