## JURY RECORD IS ALMOST SMASHED

**Failure Alone of John Seibert to Answer Roll Call Prevents**

If John Seibert, a South Hanover township farmer, had only turned up for roll call this morning at the opening of January quarter sessions all records for jurors' attendance would have been smashed to smithereens.

However John didn't answer. He was the only one of a panel of seventy-two who didn't appear.

Harry B. Etter, a clerk, Second ward, Middletown, was chosen foreman of the grand jury, and John M. Chisholm, a Royalton moulder, was excused.

The court organized in record time today although the session was adjourned at 12:30 o'clock in order that court attorneys and attaches might attend the memorial services for Attorney C. H. Backenstoe.

An innovation was made their quarterly returns. For the first time in four years the patrolmen did not tramp into the courtroom two and two, and wheel a prisoner.

Before the first cases were started the trial list of January Common Pleas court which begins next week was called over.

In No. 2 courtroom a jury tried Charles Crenshaw alias Craig. The prisoner is a negro who was charged with having obtained several small boys.

Additional Law Judge S. J. M. McCarrill permitted the trial jury to be continued.
