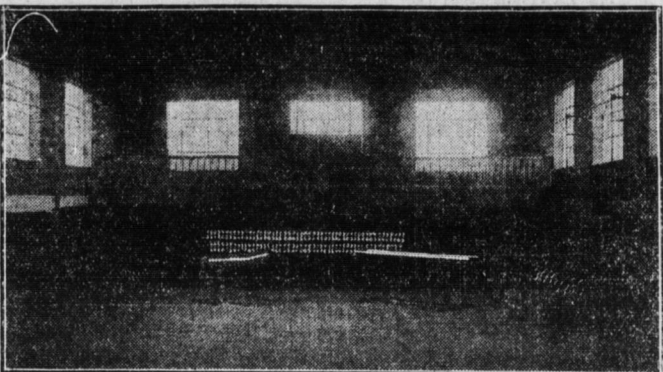

To Tell of Suffering Some of the best known speakers on the needs of the suffering thousands in the war zones will be on the program. They will tell of the awful conditions under which the down-trodden people of the ages are bearing arms against the foe for which they have none of the hatred of their masters.

Among the principal speakers will be Colonel Harry Cutler, of Providence, R. I. In all America there is none better able to tell the story of the world war than Colonel Cutler. He will represent the National Jewish War Relief Committee. Among the local speakers will be President Judge George Kunkel, of the Dauphin county bench, and State Senator E. E. Beldeman. David Kaufman will be chairman of the meeting.
