ST. MARY'S PLANS \$30,000 CHURCH

Will Be Built on Foundation of Uncompleted Edifice; School Needs Room

The erection of a handsome new church, at a cost of about \$30,000, was practically decided upon by the congregation of St. Mary's Croation Catholic Church, at a meeting last evening.

A building committee of twelve members, with the Rev. Father. Anthony Zuvich, the rector, as chairman, was elected to confer with an architect about plans and to report at a later meeting. At this second meeting the cost of the new structure will be decided when to commence building operations.

The new edifice will be erected on the site near the present church, obtained in 1906 when a new building was started. The foundations of this structure which was never completed will be used for the proposed church.

Need Room For School

Erection of a new edifice is made necessary by the rapid growth of the parish under the rectorate of Father Zuvich and by the growth of St. Mary's parochial school. At the present time St. Mary's Church is in the same building with the parochial school but the school is expanding so rapidly that it is essential that more room be obtained for the pupils as early as possible.

At present St. Mary's parochial school has an enrollment of 210 pupils. During the past year the Rev. Father Zuvich has baptized 114 children. For these reasons it is proposed to build a new church which will be used solely as a place of worship. The present building may then be turned over for school purposes alone.

Foundations Already Built
