Millersburg, Pa., Jan. 24 .- Simon S Bowman, one of the best-known lawyers of the Dauphin county bar, died at his home in Union street early yesterday morning, aged 72 years. Death came as the result of a stroke of paralysis sustained about two weeks paralysis sustained about two weeks ago. Mr. Bowman was a lifelong resident of Millersburg and took an active part in the affairs of the borough, having served as burgess, councilman and school director. He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church and for many years was class leader and superintendent of the Sunday school. During the Civil War Mr. Bowman enlisted at Camp Curtin, Harrisburg, in Company G. Thirty-seventh Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers, and was a member of Kilpatrick Post, No. 212, G. A. R., of Millersburg, and for more than twenty-five years served as its adjutant and for the last two years had been post commander, he having succeeded the late Henry Cordes. He was a member of Susquehanna Lodge, No. 364. F. and A. M., and was also vice-president of the Dauphin County Bar Association. He was admitted to the bar April 26, 1866, and opened an office at Millersburg, and for many years also had an office at 222 Market street. Harrisburg.
