Official Figures Are 549,467; President Wilson Selects President Tells Americans to Balkan Situation Undergoing Change

AUSTRIANS ADVANCING IS COMPLETE SURPRISE COMMENTS ON LIARS

Greeks Are Reinforcing Detachments Along Albanian Border

More than half a million casualties have been suffered by the British forces so far in the war. The official figures giving the total up to January 9, made public to-day, place them at 549,467, the number being made up of 24,122 officers and 525,345 men.

Operations which may have an important bearing upon the Balkan sit-uation are now taking place in Aluation are now taking place in Albania. The situation there is somewhat clouded, but it appears that the Austrians and Bulgarians jointly are making the most of what appears to be their present opportunity to overtun the country, in which little effective opposition to their action is apparent. The entente powers seem to be placing reliance on Essad Pasha, who favors their cause, to hold the forces of the Teutonic allies in check temporarily, but what measures, if any, are being taken to assist him are not yet apparent.

Greeks Strengthen Force

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The Greeks are said to be reinforcing their detachments at Albanian border points and developments as to the attitude to be adopted by the Greek government, in view of the Bulgarian activities in Southern Albania, are being closely watched by entente

New York, Jan. 28.—President Wil-on returned to Washington to-day, leaving a message to Americans to prepare for a time when the inter-national relations of the country may national relations of the country may not be so bright as to-day. Frankly admitting his change of mind on the preparedness issue within the year, he called upon Americans to insist upon a body of 500,000 trained citizens who will serve as a national military reserve immediately available under conditions of danger.

His utterances at New York were regarded as expressing the keynote of the preparedness campaign through-

regarded as expressing the keynote of the preparedness campaign throughout the Middle West upon which he starts late to-day. He spoke before the Railway Business Association banfore a gathering of 700 clergymen and at the banquet of the Motion Picture Board of Trade.

"I cannot tell you what the international relations of this country will be to-morrow," said the President, at the railway business association banquet, "and I use the word literally. And I would not dare keep silent and let the country suppose that to-morrow was certain to be as bright as to-day."
