Market Is Still Climbing; War
Shares Advance; Secondary
Dealing Irregular

New York, Feb. 3. - A more moder-
ate continuance of yesterday's for-
ward movement was recorded by to-
day's early market, initial offerings
showing variable gains in most divi-
sions of the active list. Texas Com-
pany and Mexican Petroleum were one
to higher, with similar ad-
vances in some of the war shares, mo-
tors and certain specialties, including
American Locomotive and American To-
bacco. Rails were relatively inactive,
with fractional improvement in Balti-
more and Ohio, Canadian Pacific, Rock
Island and Southern Railway. Fed. I.
Steel was barely steady on light
trading. Secondary quotations were
more irregular.

SCHOOL DIRECTORS
OF STATE HERE
Manual Training Is Rural;
Teachers Posted on Rural
Conditions Needed

The use of every public school build-
ing to its fullest capacity was urged
by Dr. William M. Davis, superintendent
of public schools of Pittsburgh,
the first speaker at the opening session
of the twenty-first annual convention
of the directors' department of the
Pennsylvania State Educational Asso-
ciation in Technical high school auditor-
ium.

Dr. Davidson's subject was "The
Old Order Changeth." He said: "Too
many opportunities are being over-
looked by educators to-day. School
children to-day should be given every
advantage possible, not only for book
learning, but in manual training."

The other speaker this morning was
R. O. Wellington, superintendent of Pot-
ter county schools. His subject was
"Problems in Rural Schools."

Dr. Wellington recommended the same
modern conveniences in rural schools
as are enjoyed in cities, proper mural
decorations, good music, and so on.

"The teaching of Greek, Latin, Ger-
man and French in rural schools does
not solve the problem of life," declared
Dr. Wellington. "Teachers should be
selected who know all about rural con-
ditions, and let us elect capable di-
rectors with broad views."

The convention opened this morning
at 9:30 o'clock with devotional exer-
cises by the Rev. Lewis S. Mudge,
D. D., pastor of Pine Street Presby-
terian Church. The 250 directors in
attendance were welcomed by the Rev.
William N. Yates, D. D., member of
the Harrisburg School Board. Charles
M. Magee, chairman of the executive
committee, responded.

Music was furnished by a chorus
from the rooms of Miss Minnie Sam-
ple and Miss Annie Bender, Fager
building, under the direction of Miss
Joseph D. Enterline, Jamestown.

dent of the association:

the annual address of J. Newton
Rhoads, Reading, president, and by
J. George Becht, secretary of the State
Board of Education, on "Pension Sys-
tem for Teachers." He will open the
question box after his address. The
report of the legislative committee was
made late this afternoon. This even-
ing Samuel D. Foss, congressman from
Ohio, will deliver an address. Music
will be furnished by the Technical
high school orchestra.

all school bonds. The session yes-
terday afternoon was attended by sixty
delegates, who were welcomed by

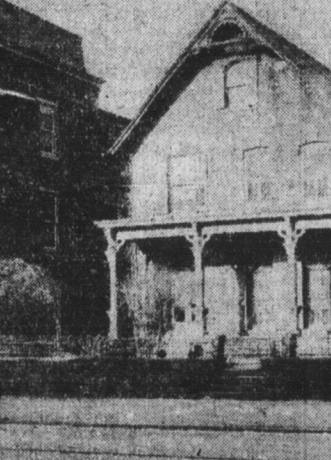
