LECTURES ABOUT MUSICAL CLUB'S THE PHILIPPINES GENERAL CONCERT

The Rev. William B. Cook Addresses Keystone Chapter, Daughters of 1812 Today

The Rev. William B. Cooke who has spent much time in the Philippines, gave a most interesting talk on "Present Day Conditions in the Philippines" this afternoon before the Keystone Chapter, United States Daughters of 1812, meeting at the residence of Mrs. James Barr Meersereau, 1904 North Second street.

The speaker told of the exposition usually held in the Islands during the month of February, and asked the guests to travel with him sightseeing. The conditions of life; the products; the vegetable and animal life preceded a view of the human life there, with its variety of tribes and languages and the common characteristics of the unity of the race.

Some of the problems of the Philippines were discussed, touching on the military, commercial and administrative sides, and the larger and more unselfish view of treating the Island as a common humanity.

Mrs. Meersereau, the regent of the chapter presided for the first time since her appointment and an informal program included vocal numbers by Miss Katharine Heiche, "Carmena," "Love is the Wind," and "Songs My Mother Taught Me," a brief sketch of the recent State meeting of the order in Philadelphia, and current events by Mrs. Mabel Cronise Jones.

Attractive booklets just published by the chapter containing its history since 1812, and also the booklets are bound in gray and blue with the insignia of the order on the cover. Three cuts adorn the pages of the booklet, one of the handsome bronze marker placed by Keystone chapter on the school building to commemorate the site of Old Camp Curtin, October 14, 1911, the others a view of the gateway at Silver Spring churchyard and one of the bronze tablets erected by the Carlisle and Harrisburg Chapters, Daughters of the American Revolution, and Keays Chapter, D. S. Daughters of 1812 in honor of the soldiers buried there. The data of the chapter for the past 16 years is arranged for quick reading and tells of many interesting events and work well done.
