

HARRISBURG'S FIRST PENNSYLVANIA STATION



This station stood at the Northeast corner of Market street and Meadow Lane, It was erected in 1837 by the Harrisburg, Portsmouth, Mt. Joy and Lancaster Railroad Company; and leased by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, April 21, 1849. It was torn down in 1856 to make room for the second station which was completed in 1857. The present Pennsylvania station was completed November 1, 1887.

The first station was a frame structure. The above picture was drawn from memory by George Bucher Ayers, one of Harrisburg's early architects. The picture from which the above plate was made, with a picture of the second station, was presented to E. N. Jones, retired passenger engineer, 504 Calder street by William Bender Wilson, a former Harrisburger, who is the recognized authority on historical matters pertaining to the Pennsylvania Railroad in and about Harrisburg.
