



No Change in Limit Rule; Suspension Means No Pay

New York, Feb. 10. - No change

New York, Feb. 10. — No change was made yesterday in the rule limiting the number of players to twentyone by the National League magnates, although Boston, Chicago and New York went on record as favoring an increase to twenty-two players for each club.

The word "manager" as well as "player" was read into the rule governing the deduction of salary during a term of suspension, and it was agreed that any club guilty of an infraction of this law would be fined \$250.

On motion of President Ebbets, of Brooklyn, that the drafting system be changed so that the lower division clubs would be afforded the first privilege of obtaining players, no definite action was taken. It was the sense of the meeting, however, that such a change would be desirable and the
