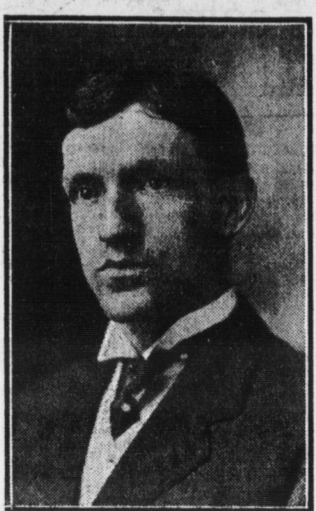

BURGESS WANTS 3 MORE POLICE

Recommends Early Passage of Traffic Ordinance and Placing of Signs

Appointment of three extra patrolmen and a desk officer for night duty; the early enactment of a traffic ordinance and the placing of traffic signs along the principal thoroughfares—these are a few of the recommendations made by Burgess Fred Wigfield to council in his annual report submitted last evening.

Burgess Wigfield reported that the police made twenty-four arrests during the year and that fines amounting to \$46 were collected and costs amounting to \$122 were paid.

Wants Desk Officer "I recall these facts to your honorable body so that you will not overlook the vital necessity of bringing about an early date some arrangement whereby it will be possible to substitute a desk officer for a patrolman taken off patrol duty for some unavoidable cause.

Urges Traffic Ordinance "There are two other suggestions which I would like to make. They are the early enactment of a traffic ordinance, such as recommended to your honorable body some months ago and introduced, but for some unexpected reason, has not been passed.

Put Up Traffic Signs "We all agree that our borough is well to the front in the State in a great many respects, and after making these improvements, I think it is of vital importance that we present the same.

Three Extra Cops "There are occasions that necessitate two men being stationed at one place, especially at high school entertainments, which are surely entitled to adequate protection as every citizen is directly or indirectly interested.

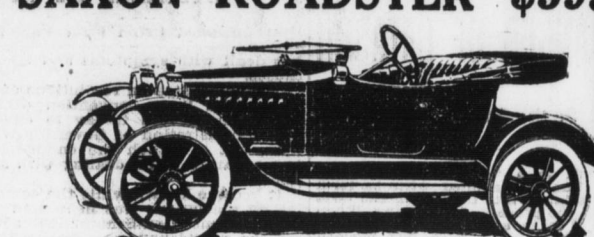

FIRE SWEEPS HEART OF FALL RIVER

wooden tenements, frightened at the prospect that their homes would be lost, fled to the snow-covered streets with little clothing.

Police and firemen early in the day were unable to put forward any theory as to the probable origin of the fire. It started in the basement of the four-story brick building at the corner of South Main and Spring streets, occupied by the department store of the Steiger Company. The night watchman in this store said to-day that when he made his last round shortly before midnight he saw no sign of fire. A few minutes later, when he was on an upper floor, he heard a noise which sounded like a slight explosion. He hurried downstairs and found the basement filled with smoke.

Flee to Streets When the fire apparatus arrived the Steiger building was all ablaze. Within a few minutes the fire had spread to adjoining buildings and had jumped across South Main street and obtained great headway, though help was called from several cities.

At the north end of the burning district the flames had made such a start that it was impossible to stop them until they had reached Columbia street. There the Edward building, with a double fire wall, served as an effective check, and by flooding the building and adjoining property the firemen got the upper hand of the conflagration.

At the north end of the burning district a water curtain on the department store of R. A. McWhir & Co. prevented a further spread. The granite building of the Musgrave, which protected a residential district near by.

The Lenox Hotel, across the street from the Steiger store, was one of the first buildings to suffer. The guests were hastily roused and made their way out by fire escapes and doors in the rear. The front of the hotel was then in flames.

The guests at the Lenox Hotel were given shelter in private residences. The fire was the most disastrous in the history of the city. The majority of the structures burned were constructed of brick, three or four stories in height.

The heaviest individual loss was suffered by the Steiger Company. Members of the firm estimated it at \$500,000 on building and stock.
