STATE AGENTS ARE AFTER VIOLATORS

Active Sampling Under Way by the Dairy and Food Commissioner's Force

MEETING ON MONDAY

Public Service Has Big List of Applications to Hear During This Week



Owing to extensive sampling work under way to determine whether food laws were being observed and the inspection of stores to note the display of oleo li-censes the number of prosecutions by the State Department of Agriculture ran less in February than in January. Scores of samples of every kind were taken and a number of instances were found where oleo licenses were not properly shown. Similar work was done to enforce the display of placards for the sale of cold storage food.

In Philadelphia dealers got into trouble for sale of smelts which were cold storage and not properly stamped and for the sale of state eggs as fresh, while in Perry county similar sales of eggs caused arrests and in Lehigh flagrant violations of the milk standard law led to prosecutions. In the western part of the State arrests were made in Mercer and Venango counties for the sale of oleo colored in imitation of butter and sold as dairy butter.  
Compensation Disallowed.—Three reports of referees in workmen's compensation disallowing claims for compensation were filed in one bunch at the headquarters of the State Board to-day. Two of the decisions were by Thomas J. Dunn, of Pittsburgh, in one of which it was found that the claimant had not been disabled for fourteen days and in another that when the injury complained of was suffered by the company for which he is working. In another case it was found that the injury was inflicted on an inter-State train and therefore the case was under the federal act.

school appropriations has been resumed at the State Treasury since the big payments of State bank stock tax and insurance premium tax have been under way and probably \$350,000 will be disbursed when the books close for this week. This is the largest sum to be paid out for some time.  
State Armory Board.—The State Armory Board has been called to meet here on March 22, when bids will be opened for the new armory at West Chester.  
To Invest Cash.—The cash in the State Compensation Insurance Fund not needed for the payments which are calculated by experience will be invested by State Treasurer Young in approved bonds. The first investment will be about \$100,000.  
Lewistown Decree.—The State Department of Health has issued a decree requiring sewage treatment at Lewistown and approving plans for such treatment at Lebanon.  
Board Meets Tuesday.—The State Compensation Board is to meet on Tuesday at Philadelphia.  
Attending Meeting.—Lew R. Palmer, chief inspector, and Albert L. Allen, assistant manager of the State Compensation Fund, are in Philadelphia attending the Insurance Rating and Inspection Board to-day.  
Compliments for News.—The latest issue of the State Highway News which is put out by the State Highway Department, is receiving many compliments for its detailed statement of the work the department has under way and the special articles appearing this month.  
Returned to City.—Jacob Lightner, director of the State Employment Bureau, has returned from Pittsburgh where he established the new State Bureau for Western Pennsylvania.  
Want to Sell Bonds.—The announcement that the State is investing its cash in compensation and fire insurance funds is attracting much

attention and there are many who are willing to sell bonds. Under the law the State invests in what it approves for savings banks.  
Public Service.—A week of hearings and executive sessions for consideration of important cases is scheduled for the Public Service Commission commencing Monday, the jitney and milk rate controversies being listed for decision. Monday the commission will have application day and thirty new electric companies are asking for charters. The following week a number of hearings will also be held.  
Field Conference.—State Zoologist H. A. Surface to-day announced that all field men of the Department of Agriculture's orchard service would be called here for a conference next week at which material as well as pictures of trees would be shown. The plans for the Spring demonstrations will be outlined. Secretary Patton will probably attend some of the demonstrations.  
Meet in Philadelphia.—Next Tuesday's meeting of the State Compensation Board, will be held in Philadelphia when several cases from the eastern counties will be considered.
