CITY'S BIG PAR' IN PREPAREDNESS

Director J. E. Lathrop, New York, Discusses Phases of Municipal Planning

"In the event of war, our cities, especially the great industrial and trans-portation centers, could not discharge their duties to the nation were they unprepared in two respects; proper planning and efficient operation," declared John E. Lathrop, director of the city planning department of the American City Bureau of New York at the joint meeting of the Altoona Chamber of Commerce, city officials and members of the real estate asso-ciation, incident to the annual con-vention of the Pennsylvania Commer-

cial executives.
"City Planning," he continued, "is "City Planning," he continued, "is not tying pink bows to lamp posts. It is the work of building the whole physical city, of co-ordinating every phase of construction, of determining normal, economic relationship between streets, transit lines, transportation lines and terminals, heights of buildings, desirable housing for all classes, play or recreation spaces for the people."

The City in War Time

The City in War Time

"In the event of war, our cities would be dominant factors in the nation's activities," he continued. "In them the manufacturing would be carried on; transportation of troops, munitions and rations would center in them; the cities would supply at least one-half the fighters, exchange and barter would be almost exclusively their function; thus the efficiency of our cities would exactly measure the efficiency of the nation. Equally in peace the same element of municipal efficiency necessarily determines the efficiency of the country.

"Americans," when on Director Lathrop, "have not given much thought to the city as a whole. Our election machinery has been used almost exclusively in settling purely political questions; and we have not paid normal heed to the direction of desirable municipal machinery. We shall, I believe, find our solution for successful operation of cities in the commission-manager form of government. iladelphia, March 6. — Stocks
