HEAR SARA LEMER IN FINE RECITAL

Capacity of Indian School Auditorium Taxed by an Applauding Audience

Sara Lemer, who gave a violin recital Saturday evening at the Carlisle Indian School to an enthusiastic audience of eight hundred, proved conclusively that leading an orchestra playing for dances and the like hasn't spoiled her in the least for classical programs.

Miss Lemer was in excellent form, playing with her characteristic beautiful tone and delicacy, and, when occasion demanded it, with a sprightliness and verve. The group of four Schubert numbers and the two by Kreutzer were perhaps the favorites, although the great "Ballade et Polonaise" by Vieuxtemps, so difficult and beautifully done, received hearty applause. A match string played the accompaniments sympathetically and well.
