Washington, March 14.—Shortage of paper stock in the United States was discussed at a conference yesterday between Secretary Redfleid and Charles A. Holder, of the Foreign Trade Advisers Office. France's embargo of the export of rags has caused many American manufacturers to fear they may have to curtail production of their mills.

The Department of Commerce recently appealed to housewives to save old papers and rags. To-day the department began sending out a million circulars to be posted in post offices and elsewhere throughout, arguing that papers and rags be saved. The commerce department promises to put those who save papers and rags in touch with manufacturers. Chambers of commerce and trade associations have been asked to co-operate.
